

Happy Pride Month!

It's my privilege to formally introduce the 2024 edition of the New York City LGBTQIA+ Resource Guide—a comprehensive directory of organizations and services designed to address the needs of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex, and Asexual individuals in the city. This guide serves as a reaffirmation of the New York City Comptroller Office's ongoing commitment to celebrating and supporting LGBTQIA+ communities across the city, providing access to essential services and inclusive spaces for all.

Despite the strides we have made in ending discrimination against LGBTQIA+communities, we are witnessing a rise in inhumane and dangerous rhetoric and attacks right here in our city. Recently, Community Education Council 2 in Manhattan passed a resolution seeking to prohibit transgender girls from participating in school sports in accordance with their gender identity. This resolution is nothing more than a bigoted ploy to strip trans children of the protections enshrined in our city and state Human Rights Laws and years-long DOE policies. In light of the growing hate and transphobia in our city and around the country, it is imperative we stand up for our children and fight to guarantee equal opportunity for all NYC students to play. Excluding transgender athletes deprives them of full engagement in school activities, impacting their well-being and sense of inclusion. According to one national survey 86% of transgender and nonbinary youth say recent debates around anti-trans bills have negatively impacted their mental health. Two-thirds of transgender students in NYC report feeling sad or hopeless.

Additionally, NYC has welcomed asylum seekers who identify as LGBTQIA+ and continue to face unique challenges that require urgent attention from the City. Many newly arrived asylum seekers come from countries where they face repression and persecution on the basis of their gender identity or sexual orientation. Access to immigration legal services, housing, and health services is critical for their safety and well-being, and the City must ensure that initiatives are put in place to address these issues in a culturally responsive way. Through this, I believe the City can create a more

inclusive and supportive environment for LGBTQIA+ asylum seekers fulfilling its commitment to human rights and dignity for all. Our Office will always work to uplift all New Yorkers and support equitable and inclusive access to resources.

Florida's "Don't Say Gay" law and other bills like it have become a topic of national concern and symbolize a troubling trend in the erosion of LGBTQIA+ rights. Such legislation prohibits discussions about LGBTQIA+ topics in schools, perpetuating stigma and marginalization. It reflects broader efforts to backtrack on the progress made in LGBTQIA+ rights, signaling a regression in social equality often paired with attacks on discussions around racial justice and equity. The attack on LGBTQIA+ rights are a part of broader efforts to undue the right to bodily autonomy and reproductive care and roll back protections against racial discrimination. Such attacks stem from misinformation and prejudice, and chip away at the cherished rights we all enjoy.

Even though there's still significant work ahead to build a world centered on joy and committed to the dignity of all New Yorkers, the extensive list of LGBTQIA+ civic and cultural resources in the city inspire confidence that we will eventually achieve this vision. My Office remains steadfast in its commitment to inclusivity and equality and as New York City Comptroller, I pledge to push back against regressive measures whenever they come to our city and will continue advocating for LGBTQIA+ rights across our city, state, and country. Every New Yorker deserves to be treated with dignity and respect, irrespective of whom they love or how they identify.

We hope you will find this edition of the LGBTQIA+ guide to be a useful resource — and encourage you to share it colleagues, friends, and neighbors who may be interested. 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Help Obtaining Benefits

A number of programs provide support to New York City residents who may need assistance. Information about some of these programs is below and can also be obtained by calling 311. In addition, ACCESS NYC is an online screening tool that can help you determine the City, State, and Federal health and human service benefit programs for which you are potentially eligible. Please visit access.nyc.gov.

Reporting Discrimination

New York City's Human Rights Law is among the most expansive civil rights laws in the country, prohibiting discrimination in employment, housing, and public accommodations based on gender (including sexual harassment), gender identity, and sexual orientation.

If you experience discrimination in New York City, you have the option of either filing a claim in court or filing a claim with the Law Enforcement Bureau of the New York City Commission on Human Rights (Commission). To report discrimination to the Commission, call 311 or (718) 722-3131. You can also learn more about options available to you and the process of filing a claim at http://www1.nyc.gov/site/cchr/help/i-need-help.page.

Cash Assistance

Cash Assistance provides monetary assistance to eligible low-income families and individuals. To find a New York City Job Center where you can apply for Cash Assistance and other public benefits, call 311 or visit http://www1.nyc.gov/site/hra/locations/job-locations.page.

Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC)

Working families that earn below a certain income level may be able to receive the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). The amount of the refund depends on the family's income and individuals' marital and parental status. To learn more about the EITC and how you can claim it, call 311 or visit www.nyc.gov/eitc.

Emergency Housing

To obtain assistance if you are homeless, call 311 or visit the following Department of Homeless Services intake centers:

- Adult families: Adult Family Intake Center (AFIC), 400-430 East 30th Street, New York, NY.
- Single adult men: 30th Street Intake Center, 400-430 East 30th Street, New York, NY.
- Single adult women: HELP Women's Shelter, 116 Williams Avenue, Brooklyn, NY 11217 or Franklin Shelter, 1122 Franklin Avenue, Bronx, NY.

Financial Empowerment Centers

Financial Empowerment Centers provide free services including money management and budgeting, financial planning, credit and debt counseling, and affordable banking services. Housing Assistance

There are a number of affordable housing programs in New York City:

- Public housing is government-owned housing that is available to certain low-income individuals and families through the New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA). To obtain more information, call 311, visit http://www1.nyc.gov/site/nycha/eligibility/apply.page, or go to a NYCHA Walk-In Center located at either 478 East Fordham Road (1 Fordham Plaza), 2nd Floor, Bronx, NY or 787 Atlantic Avenue, 2nd Floor, Brooklyn, NY.
- Section 8 Housing Vouchers can be used by a family or individual to help pay the cost of renting a private home or apartment. Two government agencies administer Section 8 Programs: New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA) and New York City Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD). Information can be obtained through NYCHA or through HPD at http://www1.nyc.gov/site/hpd/section-8/about-section-8.page.

 City-subsidized affordable housing programs offer apartments at belowmarket rent to individuals and families that meet certain income qualifications. These programs are administered by HPD. For more information, visit http://www1.nyc.gov/site/hpd/renters/find-housing.page.

Job Training

NYC Workforce1 Career Centers help people find and prepare for a job. The centers provide information about new jobs and refer people to educational and occupational skills training classes. Medicaid

Medicaid is a program that helps with medical costs for people with limited income and resources. For additional information, please contact the Medicaid Helpline at (888) 692-6116.

Municipal ID: IDNYC

In 2014, the City of New York passed a law creating a municipal identification card called "IDNYC" for residents of New York City 14 years of age and older. The IDNYC card is photo identification that can be used for many purposes, such as accessing programs and services from City government, entering City government buildings and schools, identifying oneself to NYPD police officers, and opening checking accounts at certain financial institutions. To obtain an IDNYC

card, you must complete an application form and submit it at an IDNYC Enrollment Center. To make an appointment, call 311 or go to www.nyc.gov/IDNYC.

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

SNAP, also known as food stamps, are cash benefits in the form of coupons and Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) cards that help families with low incomes buy food. To apply for SNAP, call 311 or visit http://www1.nyc.gov/site/hra/help/snap-benefits-food-program.page.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

SSI is a cash benefit for very low-income elderly (65 and older), blind, or disabled individuals. A person can apply for SSI at any Social Security Administration (SSA) Office or by calling (800) 772-1213.

Unemployment Insurance

Unemployment insurance is temporary income for eligible workers who lose their jobs through no fault of their own and who are ready, willing, and able to work. To file a claim for unemployment insurance, call (888) 209-8124 or apply online at http://www.labor.ny.gov/unemploymentassistance.shtm.

Wage Protections

Pursuant to Articles 8 and 9 of the New York State Labor Law and Sections 6-109 and 6-130 of the New York City Administrative Code, the New York City Comptroller's Office investigates violations of prevailing wage and living wage laws for work performed within the City of New York. If you believe your wages were stolen, please contact the NYC Comptroller's Office at (212) 669-4443 or laborlaw@comptroller.nyc.gov. For more information, visit Enforcement & Protections.

Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Program

The WIC program provides access to healthy food for certain pregnant women, mothers, and young children. To receive more information, including locations where you can apply for WIC benefits, call (800) 522-5006.

Workers' Compensation

Workers who get sick or hurt because of their job have the right to be compensated. Workers' Compensation benefits may include: (1) compensation for medical care and treatment of work-related injuries and illnesses; (2) cash benefits if the injury or illness prevents a worker from working; and (3) death benefits for the surviving spouse or dependent children of a worker who was killed on the job. 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ARE YOU EMPLOYED ON ANY OF THE FOLLOWING?

- Construction work on New York City public work projects such as streets, parks, public schools, subway stations, etc.
- > Street excavations by utilities such as Con Edison or National Grid.
- ➤ Building service work such as janitor or doorperson in City office buildings or residential apartment buildings receiving certain property tax exemption benefits.
- ➤ Food services or temporary office services at City agencies.

YOU MAY QUALIFY FOR PREVAILING WAGE:

A wage and benefit rate set annually by the New York City Comptroller for each trade or occupation for employers performing the above-described work. Prevailing wage rates are significantly higher than minimum wage and are published at www.comptroller.nyc.gov/wages.



EXAMPLE:

Laborer (Foundation, Concrete, Excavating, Street Pipe Layer and Common)

Wage + Benefit Rates Per Hour: \$96.73

Wage Rate Per Hour: \$44.50 + Supplemental Benefit Wage Rate Per Hour: \$52.23 Effective Period: 7/1/2023-6/30/2024



EXAMPLE:

Residential Building Cleaner/Porter, Doorperson, Elevator Operator (43+ months of employment)

Wage + Benefit Rates Per Hour: \$43.15

Wage Rate Per Hour: \$27.95 + Supplemental Benefit Wage Rate Per Hour: \$15.20 Effective Period: 1/1/2024-4/20/2024

New York City Minimum Wage Rate Per Hour: \$16.00

WHAT TO KNOW:

Workers are entitled to unpaid prevailing wages REGARDLESS OF IMMIGRATION STATUS.

- The Office of the NYC Comptroller DOES NOT inquire about immigration status and does not allow employers to raise the issue at hearings.
- We DO NOT disclose the names or identities of complaining workers unless necessary for settlement or hearing. Workers have the option of remaining anonymous.
- You can still submit a complaint even if your employer has offered you a settlement, but you feel the amount is not correct.



CONSTRUCTION WORKERS

Construction workers employed by private contractors on NYC public works projects are entitled to prevailing wages and benefits.

If you are employed by a contractor or subcontractor performing food services or temporary services for City agencies you may be entitled to prevailing wages under NYC Administrative Code Section 6-109.

For example:

BUILDING SERVICE EMPLOYEES

Building service workers may be entitled to prevailing wages and benefits if they are employed by:

- Private companies under contract with NYC government agencies.
- ➤ Landlords receiving 421-a property tax exemptions in buildings with 30 or more dwelling units built after 2007.
- Residential cooperative or condominium buildings receiving 467-a property tax abatements.
- Landlords leasing office space to NYC government agencies.
- Businesses receiving financial assistance from the City of New York.


